

DID YOU KNOW?

- **Inbound mobility rate** gives the number of students from abroad studying in a given country, as a percentage of the total tertiary enrolment in that country.
- For the 53 OIC member countries with available data after 1999, the inbound mobility rate is 2.7%, which is above the average of developing countries, 2.0%.
- Meanwhile, nearly 4 of the 100 tertiary school students are coming from abroad for the 121 countries all over the world and 13 OIC member countries have recorded higher inbound mobility rates than the world average, 3.8%.
- The rates are even greater than that of the developed countries, 5.4%, in 11 of them, namely UAE, Qatar, Bahrain, Lebanon, Jordan, Kyrgyzstan, Niger, Mali, Malaysia, Gabon and Gambia.
- UAE and Qatar held the first two positions with rates as high as 39%. Bahrain occupied the third rank as nearly one-fourth (24.3%) of the tertiary school students originated from other countries. Lebanon (15.3%) and Jordan (10.4%) are the other countries where more than one tenth of tertiary enrollment is from abroad.
- On the other extreme, 8 member countries have inbound mobility rates below 1%.
